Every year, we set a theme for the Art Bahrain Across Borders fair that acts as more than a representation of the beautiful work on display, but as a stepping stone for the next step forward in the Kingdom's art community.

This year's theme, "Legacy," is the concept that has carried us throughout our international exhibitions in the past year. We began in Moscow at the Cosmoscow Art Fair before launching our first-ever exhibit in Paris at the Grand Palais, featuring 18 Bahraini artists in a showcase of 148 beautiful works of art. We then took "Legacy" to Singapore's Musem of Contemporary Arts, and finally to Bahrain Art Week London before our grand showcase for the fourth edition of ArtBAB

"Legacy" exists to augment Bahrain's claim of the arts, an ownership that has been an indisputable heritage in Bahrain's history, passed down through generations past. It exists to demonstrate Bahrain's position as one of the firmest creative economies in the world. The local art platform stands firmly on the base of over 100 working

artists in the country, a figure that is not merely the highest in the region, but given the country's size, extremely remarkable on a global scale.

Within "Legacy," we've hit upon milestones that advanced the way forward; our Talks program is in its largest form to date, adding a parallel to "Legacy" through the endorsement and demonstration of the traditional alongside the acquiring and adaptation to the leading-edge, like blockchain technology, virtual reality, and artificial intelligence. Bahrain's ability to distinguishably retain our rich history while still adapting to the current makes us a perfect amalgam for art connoisseurs around the world.

In this year's significant edition, we prepared to welcome over 16 international galleries from over 15 countries. In line with retaining and adapting our "Legacy," what makes this edition of even higher significance is our first step towards strengthening Bahrain's artisanal sector, a wealth of which the country has developed through the ages. Today, we're

witnessing older and experienced artisans passing the torch to younger generations that will take their legacy forward. To bring the industry to the forefront of the creative sector, we have meticulously designed the Bahrain Room, a showcase of the kingdom's artisanal wealth in design form, the outcome of which I am incredibly excited to see.

The BAB Pavilion is also witnessing an entirely new dimension, due in part to a selection committee of members from Moscow to the UK who, together with our own committee members, attended to a very precisely chosen collection of work. What is the most rewarding achievement for me in "Legacy" is that this also marks the first edition in which the Pavilion is co-curated by Art Select's own "Generation Next," Bader AlSaad and Tasneem Al Shurougi. I've been proud to watch their curation process unfold to bring forth a new and emerging generation of Bahrain's

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
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About BAB Pavilion

Tasneem Al Shurougi is a founding member of the team that launched Art Bahrain Across Borders in 2015. The Art History and Visual Culture graduate's keen focus and unique personal flair play a vital role in the success of ArtBAB since its onset. Hardworking and consistent, Al Shurougi aided in the establishment of the Artist Programme in 2016, continuing to assist in art curation process at every gallery throughout the last four years. Last year, she co-curated BAB Pavilion alongside Art Select founder, Kaneka Subberwal, This past November, she curated Accumulation: Legacy and Memory at Bahrain Art Week in London at the Alon Zakaim Fine Art gallery alongside Amal Khalaf.

Through a continuous honing and establishment of her own creative essence, she was now set to embark on her first solo endeavor, complemented by the experiences of her colleague, Bader AlSaad. This year, she strived to step up the annual Art Fair's pavilion to a new level of local impact. With an extensive selection process comprising a committee of globally renowned experts, she co-curated to create ArtBAB's largest emergingartist pavilion to date, with the purpose of pushing younger artists closer to the world of fine arts establishment.

Bader AlSaad

Bader AlSaad is a culture connoisseur who dove head-first into Bahrain's art scene over six years ago. In 2015, he accumulated firsthand experience in the management of local creative culture through a focus on community spaces and vouth outreach program and continued to do so when he was tasked to set up the foundations of another new art space in 2018. As a key part of the art fraternity in Bahrain, he has been involved at every level of the arts and managed to dedicate himself to the retainment of the local art community while crafting his individual sense of self, a careful balance that is both crucial and extremely difficult to achieve.

Alongside his colleague, Tasneem Al Shurougi, he has now been tasked to cultivate Bahrain's "Generation Next," the next step of the local art scene ready to surface into the economy of global fine arts. This year, for his first foray into Art Bahrain Across Borders, he poured his experience into the Art Fair's operations, logistics, and marketing, to bridge the gap between the emerging art world and the established through the co-curation of ArtSelect's biggest Emerging Artist pavilion to date.

About Collaboration

The fourth edition of ArtBAB sees the first commission for a collaborative art piece by Bahraini artists to be showcased at the BAB Pavilion. In early 2019, the Victoria and Albert Museum in London acquired work from two prominent Bahraini designers, two looks from the SS18 Al Kimiya Collection by Hala Kaiksow and the Atlas Stool 02b by 'bahraini— danish,' to add to their permanent Middle East collection. In celebration of this historic acquisition, ArtBAB commissioned two designers to collaborate.

The 'bahraini—danish' architects, Batool Alshaikh, Maitham Almubarak, and Christian Vennerstrøm Jensen brought their diverse architectural backgrounds to join forces with trained artist and fashion designer, Hala Kaiksow to create a dynamic unification of their distinctive fields. The resulting installation is a study of the relationship between monumentality and proportion, designed to test the limits of physical constraints while generating an intimate, and ultimately, spiritual experience.

Bahraini Danish

'bahraini—danish' is an establishment using cultural differences, both social and professional, as a means to create. Through dialogue and by vote, architects Batool Alshaikh, Maitham Almubarak, and Christian Vennerstrøm Jensen, work their way, furniture by furniture, towards finding a new common order. Having arrived in front of an opening between two realities, familiar things tend to appear differently in this new, unfolding landscape.

The establishment have been exploring local opportunities to create. Looking for artisans and materials available, new ideas always follow. Often creating objects which can simply be de-assembled, they always want to incorporate an architectural dimension, given their furniture is secretly a placeholder for their desire to make actual architecture. Their work has been presented around the Gulf and continues to make its way from A'ali and Copenhagen into the world, 'bahraini-danish' was established in Bahrain in 2016 and is named after the many historical encounters between Denmark and Bahrain especially in archaeology, architecture and dairy production.

Christian Vennerstrøm Jensen (b. August 1988) graduated from The Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts, School of Architecture in Copenhagen in 2015. He worked for Studio Anne Holtrop in Bahrain from 2015 to 2018.

Batool Alshaikh (b. August 1991) graduated from University of Bahrain, Architecture. Sakhir, Bahrain in 2015. She also works for the Bahrain Authority of Culture and Antiguities.

Maitham Almubarak (b. February 1992) graduated from Savannah College of Art and Design, Architecture. Savannah, GA, USA in 2014. He also works for Studio Anne Holtrop in Bahrain.



Hala Kaiksow

Hala Kaiksow's journey as a designer begins with the human hand and its ability to imbue garments with a sense of soul. A 21st century artisan, her thoughtful approach to craft extends to custom hand woven fabrics, natural dying techniques and handmade buttons and fasteners. Inspired by the beauty found in everyday objects and a utilitarian approach to dressing, the designer deconstructs garb from the past and present to create clothing infused with feminine strength. A trained artist and sculptor, her creative process is driven by experimentation and exploring the endless possibilities of garment construction. From her loom, she weaves materials such as raw linen, silk and hemp into otherworldly patterns and textures, further embellishing them with fragments of metal, wood, latex and mother of pearl to bring her vision to life. It is a reflection of Hala's artisanal approach to thoughtful luxury, one informed by her passion for transforming unexpected materials through age-old craft traditions. Hala's work has been recognized internationally in a number of shows. In 2016 she was a part of the International Fashion Showcase in which she was selected to receive the designer award amongst her peers. More recently she has been shortlisted for the Jameel prize in it's fifth edition which showed in the prestigious Victoria and Albert Museum in London. Her work has also shown at the Grand Palais as a part of a group exhibition in Paris, September 2018.



Abdul Karim Al-Orrayed

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Aysha Almoayyed





And he showed up the artwork combining between sculpture and photography. Moreover, he explores the same concept but in Muharrag, at Ta'a Alshabab session, in Muharrag art district. He changed an abounded lane into glories artificial traditional café, where people can go, see the characters of the place, and hear their stories. In an artwork that combined between sound art and photography.

Nowadays, Jaafar taking this subject seriously, blogging about our relationship with the place in his "Urban Journey" blog. In process to his first solo exhibition, next March, that will be the statement after all his exploration in the core of our relationship with the places.

Khalid Aljabri

As a result, he began a photography project that started 8 years ago to this date. to reconstruct an image of what his family left behind when they moved out Manama. And as a self-taught photographer, Aljabri relied on lines and shapes in his photo composition. which resulted in highly geometric and painting-like photos that include every possible element to tell a story of a place and the emotions behind it. Aljabri's then started exploring the rest of the island with various documentation projects of Bahrain's street life and its architect, with the same notion of exploring the human relationship with the place and how we deal with the familiar all around us.

She is a great advocate of education and civic life as a means of empowerment and believes that urban planning can provide for such ideas. Her intrigue and involvement with fine art and installations initially sparked her interest in Architecture and she continues to view it from an experiential, material orientated and tactile perspective.

The series of work on display comes from a collection exploring this idea of aging and decay, starting with the human hand. With time, the skin wears, tears, breaks, heals, scars and shares our individual pasts. The idea of aging holds

negative connotation in most cultures as the main association to beauty is youth; however, there is an extraordinary charm to the wrinkles and creases. The process of their emergence involves growth and learning; physically and, mysteriously, metaphysically.

To depict this gradual process, she experimented with materiality. The metal sheet, commonly seen as industrial, could erode and deteriorate as it was exposed to the forces of nature. Acceleration of the rusting process was a technique used to paint with, allowing for this 'industrial' and 'clinical' material to morph into something more organic, and of nature.


Marwa Rashid Al Khalifa

Mashael holds a BA in Urban Studies from UC Berkeley which cultivated her interest in the intersectionality between art and architecture.

Mashael's work is recognized by a timeless and ethereal quality which she owes to her obsession with the analog method. In partaking in the antiquated form of photography, she is able to approach her photography more meditatively and focuses on narrative in a thoughtful manner. Mashael believes that the ephemeral quality of analog photography translates rawness and reality of her subjects.

Shaar Banat, is a series aiming to hyperemphasize the subject matter of hair as a marker of Middle Eastern beauty. Women, depicted in a dreamlike aura, are seen drowning in their own locks and calls into question the physicality of beauty. Their faces are concealed melancholically, and thus allows the viewer to insert themselves into the photographs. This series invites questions about the reality of the beauty culture in the Middle East.

My Sister is Venus is an ode to femininity and friendship. The series conveys softness and airiness and emphasizes duality as a metaphor of self. The women, inspired by Matisse's Dance, were asked to engage in playful interactions in order to convey the natural bond of female friendship.

Mayasa Al Sowaidi

Mayasa Sultan Al Sowaidi is a self-taught artist from the Kingdom of Bahrain. She earned a BS degree in Mathematics from the University of Bahrain, a Postgraduate Diploma in Business Administration and an MBA from the New York Institute of Technology. Art is an essential part of her daily life, allowing her freedom of expression and a platform to explore her creativity.

Al Sowaidi is a member of the Bahrain Art Society and has participated in numerous exhibitions in Bahrain. Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Cyprus, Dubai and Oman. Othman Khunji



Kirill Chelushkin was born on the outskirts of Moscow in 1968. He lives and works between Paris and Moscow. After training as an architect, he devoted himself to illustration and drawing. In the late 1990s, he made acquaintance with the artist and theorist Dimitry Goutov and his Livchitz Institute. This club for aesthetic and ideological reflection reinterprets the thinking of the Soviet art historian, Michael Livchitz, an ardent defender of socialist realism. and criticises the formalist deviances of modernism. This encounter encouraged Kirill Chelushkin to practice an art essentially visual, but more axed on the reality surrounding him. He made a series of drawings of Moscow seen through his car windscreen. « Moscow Mood » describes a dark misty city like a nocturne by Whistler, an impressionist road movie in a city in complete chaos. In 2005, Chelushkin took to sculpting figures in thick slabs of white polystyrene. In parallel, he continued his investigation into photography, video and drawing. In his recent installations he combines those techniques. Taking advantage of the light-absorbent qualities of polystyrene, he projects video footage onto sculptures specifically designed for this purpose. The expressionism of the angular cutouts of the material, which are evocative of brush strokes, lends the images an unprecedented and striking pictorial quality.



Balqees is a graduate of University of San Francisco, USA (Lone Mountain College) with a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts and Art History. She has participated in numerous solo and group exhibitions locally, regionally and internationally from 1976 until the present day, and has been awarded several awards and prizes.

"My painting style has evolved over the past forty years. My early paintings were realistic in nature and portrayed buildings, specifically ruins that have been inhabited by our ancestors in the past. I have painted many scenes of places that remained in my memory as a child, and left major impressions on me."

At various stages, the issues of refuges and their dwelling and their hardships have been the subjects of my paintings. I have depicted their tents, camps and temporary shelters in semi-transparent dull colors and shades and tones with harsh texture.

"I like to show the high contrast between light and dark, and as a technique, I like to use texture to give it more complexity. My monochrome color

scheme gives my paintings a dream-like quality, and a sense of vagueness. This allows the viewer to interpret the painting and make sense of it according to his or her own background."

"My paintings revolve around the themes of belonging and memories of places. Through my abstract style, my paintings show a mystery of a place belonging to a very basic form of living, such as the caves and tents of our ancestors.

My wife Balqees Fakhro is an abstract artist by profession, and over the years we have traveled together to many museums and art exhibitions and expos around the world. I have had the opportunity to attend many workshops over the years, and have recently begun taking part in local, regional, and international exhibitions with my sculptures.

I have made sculptures using a variety of different media, including steel, wood, and bronze, and their sizes range from small to medium works, to large outdoor pieces over two meters high. My inspiration comes from nature, as I also have a passion for gardening, and I aspire to create modern contemporary shapes that blend with natural forms. My outdoor sculptures are painted with bright vibrant colors that complement the colors of the flowers, and at the same

time stand out against the greenery of the plants, trees, and bushes.

My indoor sculptures however have a more natural essence, as I like to stick with the original color of the material. When working with wood, I like to work in harmony with the movement formed by the natural grains. I like to portray basic shapes and forms, with curves and circles that give feeling of grace and elegance.

Today, in art, we are truly one world and the art heritage of all ages and all nations is part of all of us. I am attracted to new ideas and new approaches from around the art world.

Faika Al Hassan

Faika Al Hassan studied fine arts and painting in Bahrain and Lebanon. As an admired artist, her work is distinctive for its play on tens of small human figures inhabiting large and anonymous spaces. The overriding message is that of our own insignificance in the large scheme of things. The small human figures in her paintings travel the canvas in large numbers and at times in groups yet are all isolated from one another.

For her Singapore oeuvre. Faika has explored her fascination for raw unbleached cotton used for the bedding of her childhood. She sees it as the fabric of life which sustains us from beginning to end. In her paintings, the fabric is used as a visual trope; as clothing offering modesty and protection, as a container holding one's possessions as one flees hardship to make a new life elsewhere, where once unpacked, the fabrics come out to make a new home. And everywhere, her humans crowd around, travelling along paths, often not understanding where they are heading. At times it seems that the figures are trapped by the rectangular canvases they inhabit as if in a maze.

Short Profile:

In mixed media on canvas, Faika Al Hassan renders tens, if not hundreds or even thousands of faceless figures, roaming around in absolute anonymity. In her work, the painter seeks to deconstruct the relationship between human beings and the vastness of the universe. Her work is not only celebrated in Bahrain: she has had solo shows in Madrid, Brussels and Damascus, and showcased her paintings in group exhibitions and galleries in the UK, France, Italy, Spain, Morocco, Jordan, Kuwait.

Halla Bint Khalid

Halla bint Khalid is one of the first Arabic children's authors to write in both English and Arabic as well as illustrate. design, and publish her own books. She is considered one of Saudi Arabia's bestknown children's author and artists. Her works have been displayed in the USA, Canada, Italy and Germany. She has also held numerous solo art exhibitions in her city of birth, Riyadh. She founded her publishing house in 1997, through which she has published numerous titles. Halla has changed the face of Saudi literature for children through her distinctive illustrating style, and her non-didactic approach to story telling.

Halla's body of artistic work is comprised of visual narratives; in many ways, narratives that mirror her life. At times deeply personal, the visual accounts presented through her various collections also reflect the social realities of her native country, Saudi Arabia. These expressions subtly come forth, from the eyes of a socially privileged and educated woman - but a woman, nonetheless - as if they too are censored, amid a country shrouded in mystery, complexity, and contradictions.

Halla started her career as a fine artist. before her shift into motherhood resulted in her transitioning to the children's author and illustrator she is today. What resulted in the early 80s, 90s and 2000s are works that present traditional subject matter, such as figural forms and "subjective reality." at a time when depicting such "lifelike" images in Saudi was seen almost as blasphemy - certainly as taboo. What may first appear as mundane imagery of delicacy, femininity, softness and even religiosity, is much more rebellious when one places the creations amidst the socio-political zeitgeist of the Kingdom. Her pioneering work serves as a time capsule, providing a genuine glimpse into the past, which at their time of production were contemporary to the period.

The Gulf seems to be progressing at an unparalleled speed, but it is thanks to people like Halla, working away in the shadows, demonstrating quiet courage in her persistence to explore and question, which has laid the foundations for the work that is being produced by other contemporary Saudi artists today.

Jamal Abdul Rahim

Jamal Abdul Rahim: is born in Bahrain, schooled in India for 4 years and has always had a worldly outlook. He builds his art from the movement of society deeply rooted in rich Arab civilization, its mythology, religion and language.

He is a multi-talented, multi-tasking selftaught artist. He started as an oil painter, then a professional print-maker artist and a sculpture-artist.

In 1987 his works came to limelight in a group exhibition at Al Hala Club in Muharraq, Bahrain. This was the first exposure of his talent to the public of his country. In the year 1990 Jamal got his first solo exhibition held at Bahrain Arts Society, and in 1995 he got his first solo exhibition held at Abu Dhabi Cultural Foundation, UAE. Over the next few years his work was widely seen in Europe and Asia. From that period a series of solo and group exhibitions all over the world brought Jamal's work to the notice of public.

He has several national and international awards, appreciations and recognitions under his belt for his phenomenal works. After many years of hard work and obtained knowledge searching for selfrealization, expressing himself initially through philosophical forms, he finally found his self within the depths of his style of work.

He is a member of The Bahrain Arts Society. He was honor guest for several national and international art/graphic art events. He was a Guest of honor at the 4th International Triennial of Graphic Art in Egypt in 2003, Guest of honor in the 2nd Biennial of Art Book in the Bibliotheca Alexandrina in Egypt in 2006, and a member of the jury of the 26th Mini Print International of Cadaqués, Spain in 2006.

Jamal has an enormous passion towards producing hand made art-books. He has produced nearly 30 hand made book collections in association with various well-known poets and writers. His art book "Rasa'el Qasab" (cane messages) has been collected by The British Museum in 2007, and his print art work "Al Qalam" was added to the permanent collection of the Asian Civilisations Museum in Singapore in 2010.

Lobna Al Amin

Born in 1958 in the old city of Muharrag. Lobna Al Amin is a Bahraini artist who sees and lives art as a way to share and transmit childhood memories and an artistic sensitivity. Her work as an ode to heritage and to nature offers a peaceful experience. After studying at the Faculty of Information in Cairo and computer science in the American university in Cairo, she developed her artistic skills by attending several seminars and workshops in Bahrain, Cairo and Switzerland. Since 1989 Lobna's artworks have travelled the world as she participated in fifty-three group exhibitions. From Fast to West, her work has been exhibited in diverse countries and cities in Europe, in the Middle East and in the Gulf. As for solo exhibitions, her art was shown during seven events between Bahrain, Damascus, Paris and Berlin. All through her international experience she has participated in diversified events: national art centers, western and middleeastern galleries, outdoor exhibitions. international fairs and bienalles. Unesco projects, and thematic exhibitions.

Since the beginning her artwork has been guided by her passion for history, heritage,

nature and wood work. The inhabited old wooden doors have been a major source of inspiration as she started by using them as an artistic media, enhancing their mystical depth. More recently, her frequent trips to the coastal city of Asilah have transformed her art. From wood to canvas and from vivid colors to earthy, blue and grey tons, Lobna's work has profoundly evolved visually but the same sensitivities are found: sensitivity to contrasts, to the touch of smooth to rough textures, to nature and authenticity. The process of her art and her approach to the materials and artistic media always follow an essential principle: be attentive to the melody and to the stories of the wood, the air, the soil. the trees, the seas and the walls, and let them guide your inspiration. This desire to praise the gifts of nature by transposing their genuine characteristics on an artistic media is what certainly gives Lobna Al Amin's art pieces their charm. As a result. her attractive and warm collections have found their places in several private collections around the world, notably in Bahrain, Kuwait, Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, Holland, Paris and in Monaco Museum of Modern Arts

After attending the Slade School of Fine Art of London she developed her artistic training by attending workshops in Paris and Geneva. For several years her art has been traveling the world as part of group exhibitions. Since she has been reworded with the Silver Leaf Award in 2003, she has been multiplying solo exhibitions in the United States, in Europe, in the Middle East and in Asia. The originality of her work has attracted many viewers and collectors and it can be found today among the collections of Bahrain and Jordan's national museums. The major characteristic of Nabeela's work is the representation of women as what is communicated through her art is women's empowerment. From a collection to another she illustrates women's traits and specificities which relate to the diversity of ethnicities, of shapes, of social background and habits. Her work is recognizable by the vivacity of the colors used, the contrasts, the shades and the blending of tons and shapes. From Africa to Asia passing by the Middle East, women are represented

in relevant backgrounds that remind us of the regions' traditions, norms and folklores. Calligraphy is also an important element in her art, discrete or bold, full texts or separated phrases, the poems add a lyrical and nostalgic note to the pieces. If some portraits' lines are faded, others are painted in a vibrant precision that brings a unique energy to the art piece. Women seen in their intimacy or in their daily practices, in their joy or sadness, in realistic scenes or in abstract backgrounds. Nabeela uses different techniques and materials that will give a proper identity and dynamism to each artwork. Another aspect of Nabeela's work is nature. A nature drawn in refined lines and vivid colors. Lately she has been also noticed for a series of artworks depicting with the same depth and emotion the magnificence and mysticism of water in all its unexpected moods and movements. By the contrasted textures, colors, materials and the variety of techniques each piece of art emits a powerful energy. The depth, the complexity and unpredictability of life as much as its melody, harmony and spirituality reverberate through Nabeela Al Khayer's art.

In 2010 I started attending the higher institute of applied Arts in 6th of October City in Egypt as a visiting artist under the patronage of professor and noted artist, Dr. Mustafa Kamal. There I immersed myself in Abstract Expressionism. I found in it a powerful distillation of form and color, an expansive freeing space where

I could explore my emotional journey. Along the way I ventured into acrylic, and collage art and using different mediums and surfaces. This exhibit focuses on this particular 4 years period of artistic production.

Amongst the current chaos and conflict it is my belief that harmony, positivity and hope remains in us as people. We are still all a representation of humanity and in this instance; music fosters the humanity within us.

Valentin Korzhov

Valentin Korzhov is a multimedia artist combining sculpture, photo and video in his large-scale philosophical projects. His oeuvre is built around notions of Time – eternal and inconceivable – and Space – both as a cosmic world and as a material environment. The former is the source of a shape for creation of his highly intricate sculptures, the latter – the place with which the sculpture steps into a dialogue to provoke new meanings and thoughts.

The form of his sculpture appears as an attempt to give shape to particular galactic accumulations, nebulae and meteorite belts that can be observed on the images taken by Hubble telescope. "I can't speak about any conscious actions in this direction. I've just always been interested in the images of a starry sky, which I collected from the internet. The Hubble project produced and still does a special impression on me. I can look at these images for a long time. which make me see obvious shapes. objects and bodies among these accumulations of stars." The art objects turn into "cosmic molds" that present the visible forms of universal existence

in cosmos beyond our conceptions of time and space. Placing these works in everyday reality and fixing them with a camera, Valentin demonstrates a sublime law within a perceptual system that is familiar to the viewer.

The process of sculpting is performed in a traditional way while cutting-edge technologies are used when it comes to painting and coating in order to achieve sophisticated colour and light effect. As an environment for his sculpture Valentin chooses abandoned places that exist on the border of human presence, i.e. deserted ruins, catacombs and remote urban areas. His latest project Being and Time was shot on frozen lakes and fields whose flat surface covered with snow presents a perfect environment for contemplation.

Valentin is the member of Moscow Artists Union, sculpture section, His personal exhibitions took place in such public spaces like Cultural foundation Ekaterina, State Darwin Museum, 11.12 Gallery at Center for Contemporary Art Winzavod, Gogol-Center, Arts Academy and Central House of Artist. His exhibition Archeology of Memory was showcased as a collateral event of the 5th International Moscow Biennale of Contemporary Art. He participated in a number of important large-scale group exhibitions like Actual Russia and Tetraktis, as well as in main project of VIII Tashkent biennale. Valentin was included in top-100 Renowned Russian Artists (InArt 2018). He lives and works in Moscow.

Yulia Volkonskaya

Born and raised in Moscow, Russia, Yulia Volkonskaya studied painting at Moscow State Academic Art College of memory of 1905 year, V. Surikov Moscow State Academy Art Institute and The Research Institute of Theory and History of Fine Arts of the Russian Academy of Arts. Her scientific work was devoted to the Russian avant-garde. Certainly immersion in the study of this topic has had a very strong influence on her art. Today, Volkonskaya is interested in the philosophy of art.

She does not write the pictures on historical subjects, she is interested in others subjects, may less narrative, but more subtle matter. It is the relationship between people and space, man and nature, color and light.

All her paintings comes from the heart, the emotions, from inner feelings. Everything that happens in her life, good or bad, pain or joy, surprise or disappointment is immediately reflected in the works.

In the painting of Yulia Volkonskaya there are no compound plots, but the extreme dynamism of painting, the activity of color spots reveal in the author an up-todate tonus of perception and experience. She addresses the simplest topics that transform the triviality of life events into the sublimity of human existence. In these works, the plastic interpretation raises their content above the plot, telling the characters a parable character.

All these interlacing of colors and textures for the artist is life, passion, bliss, which the author wants to share with the audience, who, once in the exhibition space, will experience these feelings, catching the author's wave and looking up from the worries of the material world for a while. Yulia Volkonskaya is Member of the Creative Union of Artists of Russia, Corresponding member of the International Academy of Culture and Art, Winner of the Award of the President of Russian Academy of Arts Zurab Tsereteli in the field of contemporary fine art. Her works are in private collections in Russia, Germany, Britain, France, Slovakia.
